



FIVE MUST-VISIT ATTRACTIONS IN NIAGARA FALLS USA

These quintessential, only-in-Niagara Falls USA attractions celebrate the best of the area. With so many things to do in Niagara Falls, New York and the surrounding area, it can be hard to get to it all. If you're working on a limited timeline, you'll want to go for our narrowed-down list of activities you absolutely have to do here. Get ready for a heady mix of history, adventure and, of course, the spectacular scenery the area is known for!

1) Niagara Falls State Park

America's oldest, Niagara Falls State Park, brings you closer to the grandeur of the Falls than you ever thought possible with its scenic viewing areas: Prospect Point, Luna Island, and Terrapin Point. Hop aboard the all-electric, zero emission Maid of the Mist Boat Tour and sail along the base of the American, Bridal Veil, and Horseshoe Falls. Feel the rushing torrents of the Falls on the Cave of the Winds, a series of decks and stairs

that lead to the Hurricane Deck, and stand a mere six meters away from the roar of the natural wonder.

2) Niagara Power Vista

Learn about the phenomenal energy that the Falls produce through hair-raising multimedia experiences and experiments at the Niagara Power Vista. Peruse the 50 interactive exhibits on hydroelectricity and then sneak outside for a bird's-eye view from the observation deck, perched 100 meters above the Niagara Gorge.

3) Old Fort Niagara

Explore the grounds where Native Americans, French, British and American soldiers struggled for a continent and experience Niagara as it once was over 200 years ago at Old Fort Niagara. Tour original 18th-century buildings and fortifications, enjoy dynamic living history programs, and witness one of the oldest U.S. flags in existence.

4) Lockport Locks & Erie Canal Cruises

Take a cruise through history on the Erie Canal with Lockport Locks & Erie Canal Cruises. Travel past five of the original 1800s locks, including the only double set on the Erie Canal. Witness the widest bridge in the U.S., as well as rock cuts, lift bridges and the Upside Down Bridge.

5) Rainbow Air, Inc. Helicopter Tours



World-renowned Longwood Gardens combines the best of Italian, French. and English traditions to create one of America's most memorable gardens. Longwood encompasses 1,050 acres, offering 40 indoor/outdoor gardens and a breathtaking conservatory. Longwood is also home to the most significant fountain collection in North America. The crown iewel of that collection, the Main Fountain Garden, now features over 1700 jets soaring as high as 175 feet, with amazing illuminated fountain shows seasonally. Morris Arboretum is on the National Register of Historic Places. Founded in 1933. Morris Arboretum has over 12.000 plants from North America, Europe, the Mediterranean, China, Japan and Korea with a focus on Asian temperate species. Some of them are among the largest of their kind in North America while others are exceedingly rare.

Sites welcome visitors to experience stories brought to life in lively and informative ways, including historical interpreters, hands-on demonstrations and multimedia presentations.

World-Class Museums

The Brandywine River Museum of Art displays an unparalleled collection of illustrations, still lifes and landscapes by three generations of the famed Wyeth family. The Wharton Esherick Museum celebrates the "Dean of American Craftsman" and his unique and fanciful woodcarvings. The historic home and property of America's most famed ornithologist, the 18,000-square-foot John James Audubon Center for Art and Conservation opens in

June 2019, and features two galleries, a theater, interactive exhibits, and outdoor features. Glencairn Museum, a religious art and history museum, was once the early 20th-century home of Raymond and Mildred Pitcairn and their children.

The Culinary Landscape

The Road Trip. Who doesn't love one? It's what we've always done. There are entire shelves of books devoted to hitting the road. And juke boxes full of songs about riding out to case the promised land. We've all gone to look for the real and true America at one time or another. But what are we usually looking for? A great place to eat, of course. A classic hot dog stand. A roadside scoop shop. Barbecue joints. Diners. Bake shops. The corner café with hamburgers sizzling on an open grill all night and day. These are the places that fuel our trips and spark the stories we share with family and friends when we get back home.

Walk it Off: Walk off those spiedies, meat logs and hot pies by exploring downtown Binghamton on foot. Start by heading west on Court Street, the center of downtown that bustles with college students, patio dining, boutiques and cafes. Continue on Court until reaching the Chenango River, then head south on the Binghamton River Trail until reaching Confluence Park. This natural oasis in the heart of the city features sweeping views of the confluence of the Chenango and Susquehanna Rivers. Carousel Beethoven Street and Seminary Avenue Binghamton features six nearly century old carousels scattered in parks across the city, an enduring legacy of one of its most prominent businessmen and philanthropists, George F. Johnson of the Endicott-Johnson Shoe Factory. George F. Johnson Recreation Park has one of the most popular carousels, with 60 jumping horses lined up four abreast, chariots, and the original two-roll frame Wurlitzer Military Band Organ with bells.

Walk it Off: Walk It Off: Stretch your legs with a walk through downtown Syracuse that begins at Armory Square, a repurposed late-19th century warehouse district that features the city's buzziest area of restaurants, bars, cafes and boutiques. Proceed up South Clinton Street to Clinton Square, which is surrounded by some of downtown's best architecture and features an elaborate fountain built on an imprint of where the Erie Canal once flowed directly through the city. Then head west on West Genesee Street to Wallace Street to connect into the Onondaga Creekwalk, a 2.6 mile trail that winds its way along Onondaga Creek to the Southern shore of Onondaga Lake at the city's Inner Harbor.

Walk it Off: Park Avenue, which features block after block of patio dining, locally owned boutiques and popular pubs, is a must-visit Rochester neighborhood. Grab a drink at Half Pint Pub, known for serving two different half-pints of beer for the price of one pint, allowing customers to enjoy a wider selection of brews, or head across the street to Magnolia's Deli & Cafe, where President Obama stopped in 2013. Then wander around the surrounding tree-lined streets to admire some of the neighborhood's stately turn-of-the-century homes. For a scenic walk, drive up the winding Reservoir Road to the Cobbs Hill Reservoir, the 144-million gallon repository for Rochester's water supply since the early 20th century. Perched atop a hill and encircled by a nearly mile long walking trail, the reservoir features one of the best views of the Rochester skyline.

Walk it Off: Walk off all those calories along Buffalo's redeveloped waterfront. Start at the Erie Basin Marina for views of the city skyline and of Buffalo's 1833 Lighthouse overlooking Lake Erie. Then proceed up the Buffalo River towards the World-War II era cruiser, destroyer and submarine docked at the Buffalo & Erie County Naval & Military Park. End your walk at Canalside, a popular public space that is centered around the original Western terminus of the Erie Canal. Canalside features a boardwalk, a children's museum and a carousel originally built in Western New York nearly a century ago and meticulously restored by volunteers.

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MISSOURI: ICONIC SITES & LOCAL BITES

Kansas City - Arrival

Day 1: Have a late lunch at Arthur Bryant's Barbeque, the legendary "King of Ribs." The most renowned pit master in history, Bryant created a sauce that has attracted former Presidents Harry Truman and Jimmy Carter to his restaurant. Visit the sights and sounds of a uniquely American art form at the American Jazz Museum. The museum's exhibits feature talented performers who helped the genre thrive. Located in the same complex, the Negro Leagues Baseball Museum (NLBM) can't be missed. It is the world's only museum dedicated to preserving and celebrating the rich history of African American baseball and its impact on the social advancement of America. The 10,000-square-foot multimedia exhibit chronicles the history and heroes of the leagues from their founding in 1920 to their demise in the 1960s. The NLBM was recently added to the U.S. Civil Rights Trail. Some believe the integration of baseball was a catalyst for the Civil Rights Movement, proving that an individual's worth should not be determined by the color of their skin. Have dinner at Fiorella's Jack Stack Barbecue. A Kansas City tradition since 1957, Jack Stack has one of the most extensive BBQ menus in the country. After dinner, enjoy live jazz music at The Blue Room, Named after the famous 1930s Street Hotel club in the historic 18th & Vine Jazz District, the

venue provides a distinctive platform to present dynamic performances from the best local and national jazz talent in an intimate setting. In addition to The Blue Room experience, sit in on a "jam session" at The Mutual Musicians Foundationlocated in the heart of Kansas City's historic jazz district. Originally home to the Black Musicians' Protective Union Local 627 A.F. of M., the Foundation continues its grand tradition as a living tribute to the city's long and illustrious musical history. Jazz greats and popular local players alike continue to show up every weekend to play the night away just as they have since the 1930s.

Kansas City

Day 2: Enjoy breakfast at one of the local coffee shops or restaurants. A few suggestions are the Blue Bird Bistro, Succotash, Messenger. Next, make your way to Union Station Kansas City to enjoy the ever-changing exhibits, Science City, planetarium, shops, and grab a bite for lunch at either Harvey's Restaurant or Pierpont's. After lunch, learn a little bit about Kansas City's gangster history and how the city got its nickname: "Paris of the Plains." Gangster Tour highlights infamous crimes like the Union Station Massacre, shows the locations of speakeasies and gambling halls and explains how liquor flowed freely during Prohibition. The homes and workplaces of crime bosses and the sites of major turf wars are also

featured on the tour. Sounds like an "offer you can't refuse." After the gangster tour, head to J. Rieger & Co. to learn about the distillery's history, sample Kansas City Whiskey and hop on the only known distillery slide in the world! For dinner, you can choose from many award-winning restaurants in the city's eclectic food scene. Some of the favorites are Corvino Supper Club and Tastina Room, The Town Company, or The Savoy at 21c. Close out the evening with more jazz. Visit Green Lady Lounge, an exclusive jazz lounge featuring Kansas City musicians. Other attractions you might like to explore include The National Museum of Toys and Miniatures, National World War I Museum and Memorial or The Nelson-Atkins Museum of Art.

Kansas City - Branson

Day 3: Depart early from Kansas City, arriving in Branson in the afternoon to check in at the Hilton hotel. The beautiful Hilton Promenade at Branson Landina is a 4-star hotel located on the shores of Lake Taneycomo with shops, restaurants and entertainment venues nearby. "The Biggest Rock Party in Branson" showcases the number one hits from the most famous bands of the 20th century,

including Queen, the Beatles, the Rolling Stones, Bon Jovi, Led Zeppelin, Journey, Aerosmith and more. This high-energy production will have you dancing and singing along with the greatest rock hits of all time.

Branson - St. Louis

Day 5: Depart early for St. Louis. Arrive for a late lunch and choose between Sugarfire Smoke House-a Southern-style, local BBQ chain serving ribs, salmon, brisket cheesesteaks, spiked shakes & more-or Broadway Oyster Bar-a lively restaurant featuring Cajun and Creole dishes. In the afternoon, discover magnificent views from the top of St. Louis' Gateway Arch an iconic monument symbolizing the westward expansion of the United States and the people who made it possible. See the city from 630 feet up in the air in this architectural wonder. If time permits, enjoy a river cruise aboard Gateway Arch Riverboats. Take a One-Hour Sightseeing Cruise or one of the many specialty cruises and relax to the sound of paddle wheels churning the waters of the mighty Mississippi River while taking in the best view of the city skyline. For dinner, head over to BB's Jazz, Blues and Soups before picking up a sweet treat at Ted Drewes Frozen Custard. Since 1929, Route 66 travelers have been delighted by this popular custard stand located on Chippewa Street. Get a "concrete" and turn it upside down. This thick milkshake, made from vanilla frozen custard and blended with traditional and inventive treats, will not spill out of the cup.

St. Louis

Day 6: After breakfast, visit the Cathedral Basilica of St. Louis, which houses one of the largest mosaic collections in the Western Hemisphere. The Cathedral is in the heart of the city, just east of Forest Park, and is one of the must-see attractions in St. Louis. Self-guided tours do not require reservations. Guided tours are available Monday-Saturday by appointment only. Don't miss the Missouri History Museum located in Forest Park. Founded in 1866, the museum features both permanent and traveling exhibits about Missouri's history. At the Saint Louis Science Center, you can explore over 700 exhibits, the OMNIMAX® Theater, James S. McDonnell Planetarium, special traveling exhibitions and more. Visit the Missouri Botanical Garden, the nation's oldest botanical garden in continuous operation. Spanning 79-acres, the National Historic Landmark grows more than 27,000 plants. Enjoy a beer at Anheuser-Busch Brewery where you can also take a brewery tour and see the famous Budweiser Clydesdales. The National Blues Museum explores the blues and celebrates the genre as the foundation of all modern American music. Learn about famous musicians, iconic moments in popular culture and create your own masterpiece through interactive exhibits. Head over to Ballpark Villagethe newest dining and entertainment district in St. Louis. The complex offers areat food, drinks and an ideal ambiance for watching sports. After dinner, make your way to St. Louis Union Station for the Grand Hall Light Show and a ride on the St. Louis Wheel with 42 fully enclosed, climate-controlled gondolas that seat up to eight riders each.

FAMOUS FACES & SCENIC PLACES OKLAHOMA, ARKANSAS **AND MEMPHIS**

Dallas/Grapevine - Arrival

Day 1: Upon arrival at Dallas/Ft. Worth Airport (DFW), pick up your rental car and drive the short distance to Grapevine. Head to Grapevine Main Station, offering seven different international kitchens or get in some shopping time at Grapevine Mills mall, with over 180 shops or Bass Pro Shops Outdoor World, to get any items that the modern-day Cowboy may need. Enjoy dinner in Grapevine's Historic Main Street District, followed by live entertainment at local restaurants and winery tasting rooms throughout.

Grapevine - Oklahoma City

Day 2: Head north to Oklahoma. Upon arrival into Oklahoma City, your day continues with a visit to the National Cowboy and Western Heritage Museum. From fine art, pop culture and halls of fame to Native American objects, historical cowboy gear, shopping and dining, the figure of the cowboy tells America's Western story at this unique museum. Make a stop at the Oklahoma City National Memorial and Museum, one of the city's most notable destinations.

This memorial and museum stands as a celebrated example of a living monument to honor those who were killed, those who survived and those changed forever by the April 19, 1995, bombing of the Alfred P. Murrah Federal Building. Head on over to the Bricktown District and stop in at the American Banjo Museum. Here you will find the largest collection of banjos on public display in the world, as the nation's only museum dedicated to America's instrument. Take a fun ride through Oklahoma City's Bricktown Entertainment District with Bricktown Water Taxi. During the water taxi rides, guests will learn history about the Oklahoma City buildings they pass, as well as fun facts along the one-mile canal. Enjoy dinner in the district and check out the local bars after.

Oklahoma City - Tulsa

Day 3: Today's journey takes you to Tulsa, Oklahoma. Located on the Arkansas River, Tulsa is known for a variety of bustling urban districts, exceptional dining, and unsurpassed love of the arts and one of the largest collections of art deco architecture in the nation. Route 66

related iconic photo stops include Buck Atoms Space Cowboy, the Golden Driller, Praying Hands, East Meets West symbolic halfway point, and Neon Park at Centennial Plaza. Must-see attractions in Tulsa include the Bob Dylan Center, Woody Guthrie Center, the Church Studio, Greenwood Rising, Philbrook Museum and Gardens, and the Gathering Place.

Tulsa - Bentonville

Day 4: Heading East you'll reach the Ozark Mountain city of Bentonville, Arkansas-The Natural State. Bentonville is the home of Walmart and located on its charming town square you'll find a small museum charting the company's history and that of its charismatic founder-Sam Walton as well as classic candy, period music and more; reliving the dime store era of original Walton's 5&10. Crystal Bridges Museum of American Art is located a short walk from the downtown square and spans 200,000 sq ft of gallery space, home to over 500 pieces of early to present day American art. Further explore the downtown Square filled with history, local shopping and unique dining experiences.







Bentonville - Fort Smith

Day 5: After breakfast and a final stroll to take in the city's charms, you will drive south to the former frontier town of Fort Smith. Upon arrival, visit the monuments of William O. Darby, founder and hero of the famous Darby Rangers in World War II; Bass Reeves, the first African American to ride as a U. S. Deputy Marshal west of the Mississippi River, and Judge Isaac C. Parker at Gateway Park, all located in Downtown Fort Smith. Next stop, the Fort Smith Museum of History. From its founding in 1817 to the present day, the remarkable stories of the roaring frontier city of Fort Smith are told in fascinating exhibits on two floors. Just outside of Fort Smith is the Chaffee Barbershop Museum at Chaffee Crossing, the Barber Shop where Elvis Presley got the "Buzz Cut that was heard around the World" on March 25, 1958, as he was inducted into the United States Army. Complete with the original barber pole, you will see footage of the event and included in the exhibits is a letter written to President Dwight D. Eisenhower by three teenage girls, pleading with the President that Presley's hair not be cut!

Fort Smith - Hot Springs

Day 6: Further South into Arkansas, you'll reach the elegant spa town of Hot Springs. Located in the beautiful Ouachita Mountains, Hot Springs is known for its thermal waters, eight of which form the Hot Springs National Park. At the visitors center you can learn about the history of Bathhouse Row and downtown, including the period in the early 20th century when the city played host to some of America's most famous

gangsters. Highlights of Bathhouse Row include: The Buckstaff Bathhouse, a traditional thermal water bathhouse that also offers massages, manicures, pedicures and facials to further enhance your experience. Quapaw Baths and Spa-built in the Spanish Colonial Revival style and named for a local Native American tribe. Quapaw offers thermal spas, a natural steam cave and a large variety of treatments. Superior Bathhouse Brewery is home to the only brewery within a U.S. National Park, and the only brewery in the world to utilize thermal spring water as a main ingredient.

Hot Springs - Little Rock

Day 7: Less than an hour's drive from Hot Springs lays Little Rock, the state capital and largest city in Arkansas. First stop in Little Rock is the William J. Clinton Presidential Center and Park. Walk in the footsteps of our 42nd president as you explore the Clinton Presidential Center and Park and see how his presidency was shaped by the Civil Rights Act of 1964. See if you can spot his iconic saxophone on display! Pay a visit to Rocktown Distillery and take in one of their fascinating tasting tours to learn how grain (corn, wheat and rye), can turn into bourbon, vodka or gin. This award-winning distillery uses grains grown not more than 125-miles from the distillery. After dinner, explore the River Market District for a night on the town with music. The Rev Room is one of Little Rock's best places for live music offering a variety of entertainment options and music genres. Stickyz Rock and Roll Chicken Shack, showcases the best national and international touring bands, unique and funky vibe, and award-winning chicken fingers with warm buttermilk biscuits. Or enjoy a spirited sing-along with dueling pianos at Willy D's Piano Bar.

Little Rock - Memphis

Day 8: After breakfast, visit the Little Rock Central High School National Historic Site, the nation's only high school that operates within a national park. Here you will see the role the Little Rock Nine played in the desegregation of America's public schools. Depart Little Rock for Wilson and plan a stop to White's Mercantile, also known as "A general store for the modern tastemaker." White's Mercantile is the brainchild of singer-songwriter Holly Williams (Hank William's Granddaughter), and named after William's maternal grandparents, Warren and June White, who owned a mercantile in Mer Rouge, Louisiana in the late 1800s. White's Mercantile, "it's your one-stop shop for well, everything." From here continue to Dyess, Arkansas just a short ride away. In Dyess, visit Johnny Cash's boyhood home where you will learn about the Dyess colony. The Cash family was given 20-acres of fertile delta bottomland and a five-room house in 1935 as part of the New Deal social experiment. Today, this visitor center has exhibits on the colony and illustrates the impact that growing up in Dyess had on Johnny Cash and his music. Depart Dyess for Memphis. Explore the birthplace of the blues by taking in a performance in one of the entertaining Beale Street blues bars.

Day 9: Return your car at the airport before your departure flight.

Must-see venues include the Cabildo, the Presbytère, and St. Louis Cathedral. After, discover the different areas of New Orleans such as the Garden District, St. Louis Cemetery No. 1, the National World War II Museum. Tremé, or Magazine Street. For dinner, try one of the many New Orleans' signature restaurants. Any of New Orleans' restaurants are guaranteed to offer the best of savory Creole, Cajun, or seafood dishes that will satisfy your hunger. After dinner, take a taxi to Frenchmen Street for music and cocktails. Frenchman Street has various musical venues

featuring anything from rock to reggae and traditional jazz to Latin. Also, be sure to check out the Frenchmen Art Market. open at night.

New Orleans

Day 2: First, enjoy a traditional New Orleans style breakfast with beignets and café au lait. Afterwards, take a walking tour or a bus tour through the famous streets of the Garden District. The neighborhood is known for its variety of historic homes, from colorful row houses to Classic Revival mansions and charming cottages shadowed by giant oak trees. Nearby Magazine Street offers great shops, restaurants and bars. Next, see where Mardi Gras is made with a tour of Mardi Gras World. piece of king cake! A must-see for history lovers and all patriots, The National WWII Museum is the next stop on the list. Powerful images and extraordinary artifacts bring to life the American Spirit, the courage, teamwork, and sacrifice of the young men and women who won the war and changed the world. Wind down your time in the Crescent City with an authentic Cajun dinner and finish the evening in true New Orleans style with a cocktail and some live jazz music at The Davenport Lounge or The Jazz Playhouse, and always remember to let the good times roll!

New Orleans - LaPlace

Day 3: Head west to Louisiana's River Parishes, an area from the outskirts of New Orleans to the outskirts of the Baton Rouge area. Influences from Germans, Acadians, French, Spanish, Native Americans and enslaved Africans blend together to create a regional cultureunique even to Louisiana. Explore 10 historic plantations and eat your fill of







andouille sausage. Explore the outdoors with a swamp tour, or zip line over the Maurepas Swamp. End your day with dinner at one of the area's local authentic restaurants.

LaPlace - Baton Rouge

Day 4: Head to Baton Rouge to explore the history and charm of Louisiana's Capital city. Stop at the Rural Life Museum for a alimpse into Louisiana culture of the 18th and 19th centuries. Stop downtown for lunch before touring the Old and New State Capitols. Head over to Mid-city for some shopping and dinner at one of Mid-City's restaurants. shops offering a variety of clothing and furniture. Visit the Cathedral of St. John the Evangelist to see a 450-year-old oak tree, then have a sweet treat at the last Borden's Ice Cream Parlor in the world. Finish up with music at one of Downtown Lafavette's venues.

Lafayette - Lake Charles

Day 6: Head west to Lake Charles and drive down the Creole Nature Trail All-American Road. Alligators, over 400 bird species, marshlands teeming with life, 26 miles of natural Gulf of Mexico beaches, fishing, crabbing, Cajun culture and more can be experienced as you travel the Creole Nature Trail All-American Road. One of only 57 so designated scenic byways in the USA, and affectionately known as Louisiana's Outback, the Creole Nature Trail is a journey into one of America's "Last Great Wildernesses." Learn about alligators at Gator Chateau - A Rescue, Educate, Release program which fosters orphaned baby alligators until they are able to be released back into their natural habitat. Docents will educate you in all things alligator. If time permits, enjoy hands-on outdoor adventure at Sam Houston Jones State Park with kayaking or paddleboarding provided by Lake Area Adventure. Sam Houston Jones State Park has over 1.000 acres of lakes, trees, and rivers. The area hosts an abundance of wildlife including squirrels, rabbits, alligators, otters, nutria rats, raccoons, foxes, and diverse birdlife. The numerous waterways in this area make water sports a natural highlight at the park.

Lake Charles

Day 7: Pay a visit to 1911 Historic City Hall Arts & Cultural Center. After extensive restoration, the 1911 Historic City Hall opened its doors as the City of Lake Charles' public art gallery and cultural facility in 2004. Since that time, Historic City Hall Arts & Cultural Center has highlighted numerous traveling exhibitions from around the world, as well as regional and local artists. Explore The Imperial Calcasieu Museum, leading historical, cultural, and fine arts museum serving the Southwest Louisiana region. Try your luck at one of Lake Charles' side-by-side casino resort properties, L'Auberge Casino Resort Lake Charles and Golden Nugget Lake Charles. In addition to gaming, these properties offer golf greens, top-name entertainment and poolside getaways.

Grapevine - Arrival

Day 1: Arrive at Dallas Fort Worth (DFW) International Airport, located in Grapevine, Texas. Grapevine is centrally located between Dallas and Fort Worth, as well as the home of Bonnie & Clyde, not to mention the location where many areat musical artists aot their start including LeAnn Rimes, Post Malone, Nora Jones, and Shoji Tabuchi, making this a wonderful place to start your tour! Grapevine has a wide selection of hotels to choose from, all conveniently within 10 minutes of DFW Airport and all attractions that Grapevine has to offer. Complimentary airport shuttles are available to most Grapevine hotels. If ready to get this tour started, we suggest planning a dinner or just drinks (not included) at the Hilton DFW Lakes, Bonnie & Clyde's Bar & Grill. Here you will find lots of great history on Bonnie & Clyde as well as a magnificent view of where their hideout once was...now a lake behind the Hilton DFW Lakes.

Grapevine

Day 2: Start your day with coffee from one of the many local cafés. Take in the view of the surrounding Grapevine area from 150-feet up at the Grapevine Observation Tower. 360-degree views include the skylines of Dallas and Fort Worth, DFW Airport and beautiful Lake Grapevine. Explore the Historic Main Street District with an optional Grapevine Food Tour. This three-hour optional walking tour highlights the history of Grapevine as well as a taste of some of Grapevine's local cuisine. Be sure to note the Palace Theatre where LeAnn Rimes and Shoji Tabuchi got their start performing on the Grapevine Opry stage as well as the bank that Bonnie & Clyde's gang robbed. View the Grapevine Glockenspiel, the only Glockenspiel in North America featuring the Would-Be Train Robbers, Nat Barrett, and Willy Majors. Music & Outlaws from Bonnie & Clyde to Buddy Holly; Jessie James to Johnny Cash. May we suggest visiting the Grapevine's working artisans, including Holder Dane Gallery, Vetro

Glassblowing Studio & Gallery, the R Town, and the Grapevine Blacksmith? You will find their work throughout Grapevine during your stay. Visit Grapevine's Settlement to City Museum, which tells the story of Grapevine's settlement in 1844 to our days as a farming community to how we got to where we are today as a thriving tourism destination (Open Friday - Sunday). Enjoy a leisurely afternoon exploring the shops, chocolatiers, winery tasting rooms and galleries of the Historic Main Street District. Be sure to drop into Bermuda Gold to view the newspaper clippings and learn more about the robbery that took place at this former bank location years before. North Texas was a hot bed of bootlegging activity during the 1930s and 1940s. Fast forward to today, where Texas is now the fifth largest producer of wine in the United States. Enjoy a glass or a flight of wine along the Grapevine Urban Wine Trail, with multiple wineries tasting rooms located within the Historic Main Street District. Enjoy dinner in the Historic Main Street District followed by live entertainment at the Historic Palace Theater. (Be sure to check the schedule and cost). From the historic theater to the great evening live entertainment in the Historic Main Street District, Grapevine is the place to be.

Grapevine - Fort Worth

Day 3: Enjoy breakfast at one of Grapevine's popular breakfast diners. This morning, may we suggest an optional visit to the Texas Gun Experience? You will learn how to shoot like a real Texas outlaw. Enjoy a lunch in the Historic Downtown Grapevine District or board the Grapevine Vintage Railroad (Saturday & Sunday is only) or TEXRail (daily schedule) for the Stockyards National Historic District. There you can explore the Texas Cowboy Hall of Fame and Stockyards Station, where legends are memorialized, and unique Texas gifts abound. Do not miss the Fort Worth Herd in the world's only twice daily cattle drive - Texas Longhorns driven by genuine Texas cowhands.

Saddle up at the bar at one of the local saloons or purchase yourself some western wear at one of the local shops before heading to dinner. See why Texas is known for their steaks at Cattlemen's or H3 Steakhouse. We suggest attending the Stockyards Champions Rodeo at Cowtown Coliseum (Friday & Saturday evenings only). After the rodeo, scoot on over to Billy Bob's Texas, the largest Honky Tonk in the World!

Grapevine - Dallas - Grapevine

Day 4: Start your day with a visit to the Sixth Floor Museum, commemorating the life and assassination of President John F. Kennedy. Enjoy lunch and shopping in the Historic West End. While here, be sure to visit Wild Bill's Western Store, where you might want to buy a cold Texas beer while you get a hat steamed to fit you perfectly or get measured for custom-made boots. Next stop, Pioneer Plaza to view the world's largest bronze monument depicting a cattle drive, complete with fifty longhorn steers, herded by three cowboys. Dallas is well known for both craft beers and margaritas. This lively entertainment district is known for its vibrant murals, quirky art galleries and long-time concert venues. For craft brews, we recommend Deep Ellum Brewing Co. and for margaritas, we recommend stopping into Revolver Taco for one of their refreshing Margaritas. You will want to allow time to explore this fun district before dinner. Enjoy dinner at any of Deep Ellum's unique restaurants. From good greasy burgers, Texas BBQ, sushi, Tex-Mex, you will find a wide assortment of restaurants to choose from. After dinner, head over to one of the many saloons.

Grapevine - Abilene - Lubbock

Day 5: Depart Grapevine for Lubbock, Texas which is a 5-hour drive. Relax after a morning of driving with an order of chips and queso and a down and dirty fried chicken sandwich at one of the cafés in Lubbock. Visit the American Windmill Museum, the world's largest windmill museum, which highlights more than 160 beautifully, restored American

style windmills. Next stop, the National Ranching Heritage Center, home to nineteen acres of authentic ranching structures, rotating art galleries and fortytwo life-size bronze outdoor sculptures. Lubbock happens to be one of the top wine producing regions of Texas. Step into the vineyard at English Newsom Cellars and take in the picturesque landscape and Tuscan architecture, while drinking a glass of 100% Texan made wine. After dinner, experience a tribute show to entertainers such as the Eagles or Led Zeppelin, at the Cactus Theater, a 1930's movie theater turned concert venue. (Be sure to check ahead for entertainment schedule). Not ready to go back to the hotel? Walk next door and see another concert at one of Lubbock's most famous red dirt music bars.

Lubbock - Grapevine

Day 6: After breakfast learn about the life of Lubbock's favorite son and musician, Buddy Holly, at the Buddy Holly Center and J.I. Allison House. Before going in, be sure to get a picture with the largerthan-life statue of Buddy Holly and all his famous West Texas friends. Depart Lubbock for Abilene (2.5-hour drive). Enjoy a late lunch and view the Old West through the magic of state-of-the-art technology at Frontier Texas! Located in historic downtown Abilene, Frontier Texas brings the frontier to life and lets visitors met people who played out their lives on the Texas frontier. Depart Abilene for Grapevine (3-hour drive). Enjoy dinner in Grapevine's Historic Main Street District, followed by live entertainment at local restaurants and winery tasting rooms throughout.

Grapevine - Tishomingo - Duncan

Day 7: You cannot leave Texas without experiencing a Texas BBQ Breakfast

Burrito and the original recipe Dr Pepper, invented right here in Texas. Depart for Tishomingo (2-hour drive). Tishomingo was named after one of the last full blood Chickasaw Chiefs. The word means: Warrior Chief. Arrive in Tishomingo, Capitol of the Chickasaw Nation and Home of Country Music and Reality TV Star, Blake Shelton. Grab lunch at Ole' Red, Blake Shelton's original restaurant and honky-tonk, shop and the boutiques on Main Street or head to the Blue River which is one of the famous spots in this city to check out. Early afternoon, depart for Gene Autry, or Davis, Oklahoma (45-minute drive). On Saturdays you may visit the Gene Autry Oklahoma Museum in Gene Autry, Oklahoma named after the Singing Cowboy himself. Here you will experience the world's largest collection of singing cowboys' memorabilia from the 1920's to present day. (Sunday -Friday option) Admission to the Museum is by donation. We recommend going through the Museum first and then donate what you are comfortable giving. Davis is full of natural beauty is home to the Turner Falls Park, one of the state's tallest waterfalls, with 77-foot falls that drop into a refreshing swimming hole. Full of wildflowers and breathtaking scenery, both Turner Falls Park and the Arbuckle Mountains are popular sightseeing areas in the region. If the timing is right and you are hungry for good BBQ, be sure to eat at Smokin' Joes Rib Ranch (Davis). Then stop to satisfy your sweet tooth with special treats at Bedre Chocolate. This is the only Native American owned chocolate factory in the world, or do not miss the Arbuckle Original Fried Pies before you continue onto Duncan (2-hour drive). Once in Duncan, if craft breweries are your thing, Kochendorfer Brewing Co. is worth a stop before checking in your hotel for the night.

Duncan - Norman - Oklahoma City

Day 8: The City of Duncan is named after William Duncan. He came to Oklahoma in 1870 and married a Chickasaw woman. He started a store called the 'Duncan Store' new Cow Creek. His store was one of the key trade centers for travelers. After breakfast, we suggest exploring the Chisholm Trail Heritage Center an attraction that brings one of America's greatest cattle trails to life. Learn about the life of the cowbov and look out for those rustlers. Lunch at Wishbone Scratch Kitchen will check the box for delicious Oklahoma comfort food. Then depart for Norman, a suburb of Oklahoma City OK (1.5-hour drive). Norman is the third-largest city in the U.S. State of Oklahoma, twenty miles south of downtown Oklahoma. With proximity to the University of Oklahoma, this local hangout is sure to satisfy a local craving. Selfie stop at the Vince Gill statue, located on the campus of Northwest Classen, his former high school. He has recorded more than twenty studio albums, charted over forty singles on the U.S. Billboard charts as HOT COUNTRY SONGS, and has sold more than twenty-six million albums. Continue to Oklahoma City, settle in, and have an afternoon coffee or tea at a local stand. Meet a few locals and get the lay of the land. Check-in hotel and freshen up before an evening of fun in Stockyards City. Arrive at Stockyards City for some shopping at one of the many businesses that cater to the working cowboy. Pick up a pair of Wranglers, grab a pair of boots, or have a hat custom shaped just for you, so many things to explore. Venture off to one of the salons for a beverage before you settle into your seat at the Rodeo Opry (Saturday evening performances only). Known as Oklahoma's official country music show, this evening will feature rising stars from around the state, veterans of the Opry stage and an occasional country star. Non-Saturday options-check out a performance (tickets required) at the Criterion Tower Theater, Lyric Theater or enjoy a stop at one of the many live performance venues spread out across the diverse districts of Oklahoma City. (Live music venues are celebrated across the city, with Oklahoma City's districts including: The Paseo, Midtown, Uptown, Downtown, Film Row, and 23rd St) Stockyard City is the home of the largest stocker/feeder cattle market in the world. Since its inception, more than 102,000,000 head of livestock have passed through the iron gates leading to the Stockyards operation Cattle auctions are held Monday and Tuesday each week.

Oklahoma City

Day 9: Sleep in or take a walk through The Myriad Gardens or Scissortail Park to





enjoy flora and fauna. Continue your day with a visit to the National Cowbov and Western Heritage Museum. From fine art, pop culture and halls of fame to Native American objects, historical cowboy gear, shopping and dining, the figure of the cowboy tells America's Western story at this unique museum. The First Americans Museum (One Place, Many Nations) offers visitor experiences of collective histories of thirty-nine distinctive First American Nations in Oklahoma today. We highly suggest eating lunch while at First Americans Museum. Make a stop at the Oklahoma City National Memorial and Museum, one of the city's most notable destinations. Head on over to the Bricktown District and stop in at the American Banjo Museum. Here you will find the largest collection of banjos on public display in the world, as the nation's only museum dedicated to America's instrument. Take a fun ride through Oklahoma City's Bricktown Entertainment District with Bricktown Water Taxi. During the water taxi rides, guests will learn history about the Oklahoma City buildings they pass, as well as fun facts along the one-mile canal. Head on over to Toby Keith's I Love This Bar and Grill for dinner. Toby Keith is one of Oklahoma's famous country music stars. Everything about this place is bigger and badder, just like its namesake. The menu reflects the same attitude-nothing fancy here, but lots of down-home favorites. Evening spends the remainder of the evening checking out other local bars in the district. Oklahoma City owes its name to the Native American Choctaw people, and it comes from the native words 'okla' meaning people and 'humma' meaning red, translating to 'red people.' Oklahoma City's capitol was the only in American history to have a working oil well on the premises.

Oklahoma City - Guthrie - Pawhuska - Bartlesville

Day 10: Enjoy breakfast and depart for Guthrie (40-minute drive) which is famous for its large historic downtown district with more than two thousand mostly Victorian buildings. This Victorian city was the original Capital of Oklahoma. Depart Guthrie for Stillwater (40-minute drive). Stillwater among many other things is home to the National Wresting

Hal of Fame and Museum and the Oklahoma State University. Garth Brooks is one of the most famous to attend this school. Depart Stillwater for Pawhuska (1.5-hour drive) which was named after the 19th-century Osage chief, Paw-Hiu-Skah, which means 'White Hair' in English. A local landmark, the Swinging Bridge which is located down the road of the Mercantile from Kihekah Avenue. Park and walk, shop, and eat in this picturesque Frontier Town, the film location of Martin Scorsese's and Leonardo DiCaprio's 'Killers of the Flower Moon,' due to release 2024. Depart Pawhuska for Bartlesville (30-minute drive). Take a quick photo stop at the Tall Grass Prairie Preserve Marker, the southern-most edge of the 'only remaining Tallgrass Prairie' in North America. Bartlesville is known for its accomplishments in the business world. The city served as home to the world's largest oil companies, Phillips Petroleum Company founded by Bartlesville oil man Frank Phillips. Visit Woolaroc (woods, Lakes, and Rocks) Museum & Wildlife Preserve. A working ranch, museum and wildlife preserve, this Bartlesville establishment welcomes countless visitors each year. Woolaroc also hosts the annual Cow Thieves and Outlaws Reunion the last weekend of September. Check into The Inn at Price Tower. Spend the night in Frank Lloyd Wright's only skyscraper at the Inn at Price Tower in downtown Bartlesville, considered to be one of the architect's greatest works. Have dinner on the 15th floor of the tower or take a short walk to downtown and try one of the restaurant offerings like Frank and Lola's.

Bartlesville - Miami - Chelsea - Claremore - Tulsa

Day 11: Bid Bartlesville farewell and depart for Miami, Oklahoma (1.5-hour drive) Arrive in Miami, OK a Route 66 treasure. Miami Oklahoma is known for becoming the gateway to mining fields; therefore, mining became a dominant part of Miami's growth. Visit the Coleman Theater, a Miami landmark that began as a Vaudeville movie theater. A highlight of this building is the original pipe organ, called "The Mighty Wurlitzer," which continues to fill the beautiful theater with terrific music today. Depart Miami for Chelsea, Oklahoma (1.5-hour drive)

which was known as the center for cattle raising and hay shipping before 1907 statehood. Continue along Route 66 to Claremore (20-minute drive) which got its name from an Osage Chief known as 'Gra-moi' French traders pronounced his name 'Clairmont', meaning 'mountain with a clear view' the area became part of the Cherokee Nation, and the Indian Territory after the Indian Removal Act of 1830 was passed. Visit many of the great museums and continue along Route 66 to Catoosa (15-minute drive). The name Catoosa itself is a lasting tribute to the tribe that inhabited this region and translates "Up into the hills" in the Cherokee language. The Blue Whale in Catoosa has become a beloved historic landmark along Route 66. Built as an attraction at a swimming hole, visitors can still walk around the mammoth structure and get the perspective of what it would really be like to be swallowed by a whale-no swimming allowed anymore. Continue to Tulsa and check into your hotel. (20-minute drive). Long called one of the country's best-kept secrets, the Tulsa is known for its art deco architecture, underground arts scene, and better-than-the-coast food and drink. Make a stop at Gatherina Place. 70-acres of family-friendly activities for free and uncover unique playgrounds with tunnels, pirate ships, towers, slides, suspended bridges and more. Whether relaxing on the One OK Boathouse top-level balcony for stunning views of Tulsa or renting a kayak, canoe, or paddle boat, you will have a blast. Check out one of Tulsa's unique districts such as Brookside, Cherry Street or Blue Dome dinner and entertainment. Some fun facts about Tulsa: Country singer and songwriter Garth Brooks, 7-time CMA Entertainer of the Year is a Tulsa Boy. The 'Yield' Sign was invented in Tulsa. Before you leave, take a selfie at The Cave House of Tulsa.

Tulsa

Day 12: Start your morning off at the Center of the Universe. A short walk away you will find the Woody Guthrie Center, which will give you a glimpse inside the life of one of America's greatest folksingers. Born in Okemah, Woody Guthrie made a name for himself with hits like "This Land Is Your Land," "Pastures of Plenty,"

"Visit Rocktown Distillery Tour and tasting to learn how grain (corn, wheat, and rye), can turn into bourbon, vodka, or gin."

"Talking Dust Bowl Blues" and "Do Re Mi." Just down the block is the Bob Dylan Center. Dedicated to the study and appreciation of Bob Dylan and his worldwide cultural significance, this experience is everything Bob Dylan. Noon Enjoy lunch from a food truck at Guthrie Green (just across the street) or head on down further into the Arts District and enjoy one of its numerous restaurant offerings. The Outsiders House Museum stands on a quiet Tulsa Street corner in Crutchfield. This modest bungalow where the scrappy, closeknit Greasers lived, loved, fought, and reconciled, sits as a tangible testament to the cinematic legend. This house has been painstakingly restored to reflect its appearance in the movie and contains one-of-a-kind exhibits, collections and memorabilia associated with the movie. Continue your day at The Church Studio in the Pearl District. This historic church was turned into a recording studio and the home office to Shelter Records in the early 1970's. Leon Russell purchased the church in 1972 and The Church Studio was conceived. Russell was a music legend for 50 years and an inductee of the Rock and Roll Hall of Fame and Songwriters Hall of Fame. Today, the studio has been remodeled and brought back to a working recording studio. Have dinner at Mother Road Market, where you can select from a sampling of local restaurants housed under one roof, along with a variety of retail shops. Swing by the t-shirt vending machine for Made in Oklahoma screen-printed creations or relax at the full-service bar while here. Notable facts: Tulsa was named after the clan of Creeks called Tulsa Lochapoka who settled in this area in 1836, deriving from the Creek word 'Tallasi' meaning 'old town'. Tulsa now is often also referred to as the 'Magic City' due to oil wealth and profusion of so much money. Shhh... truly a local's secret: there is a maze of tunnels under the city of Tulsa. Plan a lunch date to explore the tunnels, famous art deco

architecture, and have lunch downtown. Be sure to add this to your Tulsa bucket list. And while you are downtown, keep an eye out for all the art murals painted on the brick buildings. The murals make for Instagram-worthy photos. Make sure to snap a picture of the Golden Driller for your Instagram. Tulsa likes to dress up the seventy-six feet tall statue of an oil worker. It is in front of the Tulsa County Fairgrounds and Tulsa Expo Center off 21st street. "Its five' clock somewhere' as Jimmy Buffet says. Enjoy areat food and music; sit on the patio overlooking the Arkansas River at Margaritaville.

Tulsa - Muskogee - Tahleauah - Wilburton - McAlester

Day 13: Depart Tulsa for Muskogee (1hour drive). Carrie Underwood, country singer and songwriter is the most famous person from Muskogee who parlayed her victory in the television singing competition American Idol into a successful recording career. Depart Muskoaee for Tahleauah (40-minute drive). Tahlequah, the capital of the Cherokee Nation, has been named of the Top 100 Best Small Towns in America. The name derives from the Cherokee word "Ta'ligwu' meaning 'just two' or 'two is enough.' Tour the Cherokee National Museum, Cherokee Courthouse and Prison. Sam & Ella's Chicken Palace is a wonderful place for lunch - their house specialty Pizza! Tahlequah is also the Capitol of the Cherokee Nation, Continue to Wilburton, Robbers Cave State Park.

McAlester - Fort Smith

Day 14: Spend your morning to early afternoon enjoying the park. Robbers Cave State Park is a favorite of rappelers, equestrians, hikers, and outdoor lovers. Depart for Fort Smith Arkansas. Start vour visit in Fort Smith at Ms. Laura's Visitor Center which is the first former bordello listed on the National Register of Historic Places and now serves as the official Visitors Center. Next stop, the Fort Smith National Historic Site. which includes the iail, the hanaina gallows, and the restored courtroom of Judge Isaac C. Parker. Walk in the footsteps of some of the most famous outlaws of the West, including the James, Dalton, and younger gangs; Belle Starr; Cherokee Bill and the Rufus Buck Gang.

Fort Smith - Little Rock

Day 15: Visit the monuments of William O. Darby, founder, and hero of the famous Darby Rangers in World War II; Bass Reeves, the first African American to ride as a U. S. Deputy Marshal West of the Mississippi River, and Judge Isaac C. Parker at Gateway Park, all located in Downtown Fort Smith. Next stop, the Fort Smith Museum of History. From its founding in 1817 to the present day, the remarkable stories of the roaring frontier city of Fort Smith are told in fascinatina exhibits on two floors. Visit the Chaffee Barbershop Museum at Chaffee Crossing, which is the Barber Shop where Elvis Presley got the "Buzz Cut that was heard around the World" as he was inducted into the United States Army. Depart Fort Smith for Little Rock. First stop in Little Rock is the William J. Clinton Presidential Center and Park. Visit Rocktown Distillery Tour and tasting to learn how grain (corn, wheat, and rye), can turn into bourbon, vodka, or gin. Explore the River Market District for a night on the town with music.

Little Rock - Memphis

Day 16: Before heading to Memphis, visit the Little Rock Central High School National Historic Site, the nation's only high school that operates within a national park. Here you will see the role the Little Rock Nine played in the desegregation of America's public schools. Depart Little Rock for Wilson, Arkansas. Plan a stop to White's Mercantile, also known as "A general store for the modern tastemaker." White's Mercantile is the brainchild of singer songwriter Holly Williams (Hank William's Granddaughter), and named after William's maternal grandparents, Warren, and June White, who owned a mercantile in Mer Rouge, Louisiana in the late 1800s. Continue to Dyess, Arkansas. In Dyess, visit Johnny Cash's boyhood home where you will learn about the Dyess colony. The Cash family was given 20-acres of fertile delta bottomland and a five-room house in 1935 as part of the New Deal social experiment. Depart Dyess for Memphis, TN.

Memphis

Day 17: The Memphis Rock 'n' Soul Museum, located on Beale Street, provides a comprehensive Memphis





music experience. The museum is curated by the Smithsonian Institute and accompanied by a detailed digital audio tour quide featuring over one hundred songs. Beginning in the fields of the Mississippi Delta and journeying through the heyday of Memphis' musical influence, the Rock 'n' Soul Museum is the perfect jumping on point for a Memphis music tour. Memphis Music Hall of Fame-What began as a tribute to Memphis' legendary musicians who shook the world has finally opened as a museum that is as outrageous as our inductees! The Memphis Music Hall of Fame Museum and exhibition introduces guests to some of the greatest musicians of all time - each responsible for shaping modern music and changing the world forever right here in Memphis! Explore Beale Street during the day and walk where legends performed and marched on the famous street. Walk to Ernest Wither's Museum home of the most holistic collection of Wither's archives published to date. Containing images from his Civil Rights, Music, Sports, and Lifestyle collections, the text of this work delves much deeper into the history behind the images than your average book of photography.

Memphis

Day 18: Visit Arcade Restaurant a favorite of Elvis Presley's. You can even sit at his booth and have his favorite Peanut Butter and Banana Sandwich. Next stop, The National Civil Rights Museum, is a deep dive into the struggle of minorities in America from the beginnings of the slave trade to present day. Interactive exhibits such as a 1955 bus, complete with Rosa Parks and barking bus driver, place one in the shoes of victims and activists alike. Experience the Blues Hall of Fame which opened in May of 2015. The Blues Foundation's Blues Hall of Fame Museum is a Memphis gem for both serious blues fans and casual visitors. With robust exhibits and in-depth history, the museum exposes, educates, and entertains visitors with all that is blues culture while highlighting over four hundred inductees in five key categories: Performer, Individual, Album, Single, and Literature. Visit the Edge Motor Museum and track the rise, boom, plateau, and fall of the American sports car as you follow trends in politics, economics, culture, and technology. Shop and explore at Crosstown Concourse. Initially conceived as a home for a small start-up arts organization, the building has evolved into a 1.5 million square-foot mixed-use "vertical urban village."

Memphis

Day 19: You cannot come to Memphis without making the trek to Elvis Presley's Graceland. While the house may not seem excessively big by today's standards, in the 1950s, it was downright opulent. While you are there, check out his two private planes and all his fancy rides in the car museum. Stax of American Soul Music pays homage to Isaac Hayes, Otis Redding and others who launched the global soul music explosion from Soulsville in Memphis.

Memphis - Nashville

Day 20: Experience over two centuries of legendary hospitality at Belle Meade Historic Site & Winery! Delve into the rich history of this lovely home and estate dedicated to the preservation of Tennessee's Victorian architecture, history, and equestrian legacy. Enjoy award winning wines or learn how Belle Meade Bourbon was born over a century and a half ago.

Nashville

Day 21: Begin your musical journey on Music Row at historic RCA Studio B. Nicknamed "The Home of a Thousand Hits," Studio B became famous in the 1960s for producing what has come to be known as "the Nashville Sound, "and over one thousand top ten American hitsincluding over two hundred recordings by Elvis Presley. Continue your musical journey with a tour of the Country Music Hall of Fame and Museum, located in downtown Nashville, to experience the evolution and growth of one of the fastest growing music genres. Visit the Johnny Cash Museum, dedicated to the life and music career of the late Man in Black. Take the rest of the afternoon and evening to experience Nashville's famous Honky Tonk Highway. Also known as Lower Broadway, this iconic street is home to legendary clubs like Tootsie's Orchid Lounge and Robert's Western World

Nashville - Lynchburg - Nashville

Day 22: Depart for Lynchburg, TN, home to the Jack Daniel Distillery, the oldest registered distillery in the United States and among the most prestigious listed on the National Register of Historic Places Depart for Opry Mills in Nashville. Get face to face with your favorite musician in the first all music themed Madame Tussauds, located inside of Opry Mills. Featuring the best in country, pop, rock, and more, Madame Tussauds Nashville is the perfect spot for a selfie with a star. Experience an American icon and the country's longest running radio show at the Grand Ole Opry. Dedicated to honoring country music's rich history and dynamic present, the Grand Ole Opry highlights a mix of country legends and the contemporary chart-toppers who have followed them in their footsteps. Walk in the footsteps of country music's superstars and get an exclusive look at what happens behind the scenes of the show that made country music famous with an Opry Backstage Tour pre or post show!

Nashville

Day 23: Start the day off with a visit to The Parthenon in Centennial Park where you will find a full-scale replica of the Greek Parthenon and learn why Nashville was called the "Athens of the South" before it was known as Music City. The USA's Southern western states include Texas, Oklahoma and Louisiana, three states that are famously known for Cowboys, Indians and Jazz.

Cowboys

Texas is synonymous with cowboys! Whether it's about the traditional working cowboy or the National Football League's (NFL) Dallas Cowboys, or Major League's Baseball (MLB) Texas Rangers - the cowboy has become an iconic symbol of Texas.

Centrally located is Grapevine, Texas, a historic town settled before Texas became a state, and home to Dallas Fort Worth International Airport (aka DFW). The Grapevine experience offers life of the traditional cowboy with cattle drives, rodeos, honky-tonks, country music, and fictional shoot-outs. See the world's most illustrious ranch, "Southfork Ranch". made famous by the Ewing family in the

television series, Dallas, and visit the Dallas Cowboys AT&T Stadium and the Texas Rangers Globe Life Field.

Oklahoma. One state, many nations. The name Oklahoma means red people in Choctaw. Today, 39 American Indian nations have tribal headquarters in Oklahoma - more than any other state. While two tribes already lived in the area at the time of European contact, all others were forced to leave ancestral homelands and migrated to what was then Indian Territory, each having their own district, culture and society. On this trip, visit tribes who reside in Oklahoma: from tribal perspective, learn of their early history, how they got to Oklahoma and about some of their most influential members. See what the Oklahoma-based tribes are today - sovereign nations with thriving businesses and cultures and

citizens who are working hard to preserve their language and heritage. You'll visit the Chickasaw Cultural Center; the First Americans Museum; Standing Bear Park, Museum and Education Center: the Cherokee National History Museum; the Choctaw Cultural Center; and the Osage Nation Museum.

Some of the world's largest collections of Art portraying American Cowboys and American Indians are found at Oklahoma City's National Cowboy and Western Heritage Museum, Tulsa's Gilcrease Museum, and at Bartlesville's Woolaroc Ranch.

All That Jazz

Jazz was born in Louisiana! New Orleans to be exact, and precisely at Congo Square! This public square was one of the only places in America where slaves were allowed to gather and play drums.



They did so on "free Sundays," where the sharing of African rhythms and dance kept their ancestral tradition alive until, as it happened, it would become the very rhythm of American popular culture.

Jazz is the music that erupted when African (and Afro-Caribbean) and European traditions converged in America and nowhere was that mix more potent than in New Orleans. Naturally, many of the earliest names in jazz hailed from Louisiana, including Buddy Bolden, Jelly Roll Morton and King Oliver. One of jazz's most original performers, New Orleans' own Louis "Satchmo" Armstrong, was as much an ambassador for the music as he was for his hometown. The newest generation of jazz musicians continue to honor the tradition while bringing in their own unique sounds.

Fabulous Food

All serve-up yummy favorites while providing nourishment for the soul.

Any visit in Texas, Oklahoma, and Louisiana is not complete without including a few delicious BBQ joints here and there. Some serve it wet, some serve it dry, some service it sweet, and some service it hot - all are out of this world good!







Las Vegas - St. George - Arrival

Day 1: Arrive in Las Vegas and drive 90 min to St. George which is 118 miles northeast from Las Vegas. The city lies near the convergence of three distinct geological areas: the Great Basin, Colorado Plateau and the Mojave Desert, attributing to the stunning valleys, beautiful landscapes and wildlife. This warm weather retreat is known for wide open spaces, golf courses, state parks and proximity to Zion National Park. This unique setting lends itself to charming hotels, restaurants, and galleries surrounded by vast and stunning landscapes. Explore Snow Canyon State Park, this blend of Navajo sandstone, petrified sand dunes and lava fields make up a beautiful playground. Nearby Anasazi Valley Trail, or Tempi'po'op, is home to some spectacular ruins of an old Anasazi Farmstead and some of the most well preserved petroglyphs in the Southern Utah region. Traverse the numerous trails the city has to offer.

Dining Suggestions: Wood Ash Rye (Advenire Hotel), Cliffside Restaurant (Inn on the Cliff), Painted Pony, George's, Benja's, Xetava (Kayenta Art Village) and Station 2 Bar.

St. George - Zion/Springdale

Day 2: Today you will drive about an hour to Springdale which is located just outside of Zion National Park amidst breathtaking mountain panoramas. Springdale has been named one of the 20 'prettiest towns' in the United States by Forbes Traveler. This community is home to farmers markets, art galleries, outfitters, gift shops, hiking, bike trails and more. Along the way you will encounter Sand Hollow State Park, renowned for its red sand beaches, stunning red rock formations and variety of activities including water and motorized recreation. Located off Hwy 9 in Rockville, after crossing an iron

lattice-truss bridge built in 1926 you will find one of Utah's best preserved ghost towns-Grafton. The cemetery includes graves of both early settlers and Paiutes dating back to 1862. The abandoned town site with adobe schoolhouse, Russell home and crumbling cabins is notably known as the location for the famed bicycle scene from the 1969 classic "Butch Cassidy and the Sundance Kid." Zion National Park is famous for its iconic hiking trails and dramatic surroundings; from strenuous, moderate/ family friendly and wheelchair accessible hikes. No charge for the Zion shuttle that transports you throughout the town and park. Today you will be captivated by a Back-country Bliss four-hour ATV Adventure (Retail cost is 212 per person but since you are booking a part of this package the price is heavily discounted). Enjoy local history, geological formations, and pristine high desert environment on this special excursion. Afterwards enjoy a stroll alongside the Riverside Walk Trail, Angel's Landing or cool off in the Virgin River.

Zion - Springdale

Day 3: The intensity of the colors-the vivid ruby of the rocks, the clear sapphire of the sky, the emerald of the grassmake Zion National Park a treasure of the West. Today, explore Emerald Pools which is an easy to moderate hiking trail or if you prefer a more strenuous hike, we recommend 'The Narrows' which is surrounded on three sides creating a natural amphitheater-gear for this self-guided hike can be booked in advance. Today you will start early with a half-day Bike ride offered by Zion Outfitters



(basic to moderate skill level required) where you will be able to enjoy some of the most memorable trails in the park. Then in the afternoon you will embark upon a VIP Helicopter Tour operated by Zion Helicopters that gives you an unforgettable bird's-eye perspective of the vast and unique landscapes in and around Zion (retail cost is 259 per person for both activities but since you are booking a part of this package the price is deeply discounted). Later in the day, you may also want to enjoy Zion's best kept secret, scenic Kolob Terrace road located nearby. The road runs from the town of Virgin up to the Kolob Resevoir, cutting in and out of Zion National Park as you witness some of the most spectacular rock formations and diverse landscape.

Zion/Springdale - Bryce Canyon

Day 4: Today you will drive about two hours northwest to Bryce Canyon National Park, situated along a high plateau at the top of the Grand Staircase, the park's high elevations include numerous life communities, fantastic dark skies, and geological wonders that defy description. Explore Bryce Canyon National Park and soak up the fresh air and wide open spaces. There are plenty of trails to practice social distancing. Today you will explore Bryce with a guided one-hour ATV Tour offered by Ruby's Adventure Tours that takes you on a fun adventure through ponderosa pine forests to the rim of Bryce Canyon National Park. (Retail cost is \$75 per person but since you are booking a part of this package the price is deeply discounted; please note that the inclusion is only available April-October). Hang around at night to enjoy the incredible night sky programs. You will find all difficulty levels for hiking, from easy (Mossy Cave; Rim Trail; Queens Garden) to moderate (Navajo Trail; Tower Bridge) to strenuous (Fairyland Loop; Peek-A-Boo Loop).

Dining Suggestions: Lunch/Dinner at the Bryce Canyon Pines or Ruby's Inn Cowboy Steakhouse, IDK BBQ in Tropic, The Pizza Place in Tropic, Stone Hearth Grille in Tropic.

Bryce Canyon - Escalante

Day 5: Take a road trip along Scenic Byway 143-Utah's Patchwork Parkway. Enjoy Panguitch Lake, parts of Cedar Breaks and loop back to Bryce Canyon via Highway 89. Enjoy the space and solitude you will find driving this route. Red Canvon-Dixie National Forest is similar to the iconic hoodoos in Bryce Canyon. Enjoy hiking, horseback riding and mountain biking on trails for all skill levels (optional). The trails in Red Canyon are all pet-friendly. Kodachrome Basin State Park is less than a 30 minute drive from Bryce Canyon National Park. Home to several towering spires and sandstone chimneys, the hues of Kodachrome contrast those of Bryce Canyon nicely. Kodachrome boasts trails for all skill levels and incredible night sky opportunities. Near Kodachrome Basin you can choose some off-the beaten path hikes such as Willis Creek a local favorite, or drive an additional 20 miles down a dirt road and take a selfie at Grosvenor's Arch. In the afternoon start your journey on the second half of the Scenic By way 12-Utah's All-American Road. This route connects Bryce Canyon to Utah's lesser known national park, Capitol Reef. Today's destination is Escalante, a quaint community with a lot of small-town charm and culture. Take time to enjoy the view points along the way. Stop at the Escalante Petrified Forest State Park for another hike or cool off with a kayak or paddle board rental (optional) at wide hollow reservoir, or learn more about the heritage in the area and stop at the Hole-in-the Rock Visitor Center. Take an evening hike at Calf Creek Falls-this six mile (9 km) round trip hike ends at a 126foot cascadina waterfall.

Dining Suggestions: IDK BBQ, The Pizza Place in Tropic, Escalante Outfitters or Circle D. Escalante Outfitters, Circle D. or Canyon Grill at the Canyon Country Lodge, Kiva Koffeehouse, Magnolia's or Burr Trail Grill.

Day 6: This morning you may take a hike through a Slot Canyon or rappel down one if you are really adventurous. Exploring the Grand Staircase Escalante National Monument will likely keep you occupied for at least the entire day. Some

of the top locations to experience are Devil's Rock Garden (15 mi. down the Hole in the Rock Road - make sure you have a high-clearance vehicle) or Spooky and Peekaboo Slot Canyons (26 miles down the Hole in the Rock Road).

Dining Suggestions: Dinner-Circle D, Canyon Grill at the Canyon Country Lodge, Hell's Backbone Grill.

Once in Cedar City, get on I-15 and you will leave the natural backdrop of Utah for the striking neon of Las Vegas. Enjoy the glitz & glamour of this desert playground. Welcome to fabulous Las Vegas!







The East-West corridor, also known as California State Route 2, ends at Ocean Avenue in Santa Monica, Los Angeles' beach city-a charming seaside escape with all of the culture, events and urban amenities of a bustling metropolis. Alternatively, you could choose an iconic SoCal drive along another world renowned road, Sunset Boulevard, which will take you on

The restaurant offers a gorgeous vintage-sleek open dining space, indoor and outdoor seating and happy hour (recommended).

Santa Monica

Day 6: Begin your day exploring one of Santa Monica's quirkiest neighborhoods, Pico Boulevard, home to a collection of below-the-radar shopping finds and unique art galleries. While here, be sure to follow Santa Monica's Street Art Mural Guide as this eclectic street contains a multitude of popular murals. Afterwards, enjoy lemon ricotta pancakes in the outdoor patio at Lunetta All Day, an allday eatery from local chef and former professional surfer Raphael Lunetta (recommended). Santa Monica's central location in Los Angeles County makes it an ideal base to explore the wider region: on your final afternoon, head 15 minutes up Pacific Coast Highway for a visit to the Getty Villa (recommended). Situated on a cliff overseeing the Pacific Ocean, the Getty Villa is an educational center and museum dedicated to the study of the arts and cultures of ancient Greece. Rome and Etruria. Afterwards, head to one of Santa Monica's four weekly Farmers Markets. The Wednesday Downtown Santa Monica Farmers Market is the largest organic market on the West Coast, where top chefs from across Los Angeles shop for the freshest ingredients, while the Saturday market is slightly smaller but still offers many organic selections. 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
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
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WONDERS OF ATLANTIC CANADA - NEW BRUNSWICK

Saint John - Arrival

Day 1: Canada's oldest incorporated city (1785) and the only city on the Bay of Fundy, Saint John has a Loyalist heritage that goes back centuries. Today, Saint John is a popular port-of-call on many of the Canada-New England cruise itineraries. With the Bay of Fundy at its doorsteps, Saint John is a vibrant port city full of urban adventure on the edge of nature. The Reversing Falls is where water runs backwards twice a day, and no one blinks an eye. Where the most powerful tug-of-war on earth takes place in the heart of the city thanks to a geological hip-check of South America and Africa, now recognized as the Stonehammer UNESCO Global GEOPark.

Saint John - St. Andrews

Day 2: Visit Saint John City Market, in operation since 1876 and built by shipbuilders. Its unique design - an upside-down ship's hull, has no center pillars or posts to hold up the roof. Nowhere else in Saint John can you

experience a traditional "farmers market" while shopping for such a wide selection of goods and services, ranging from dulse to hand-made local crafts, and enjoy a delicious meal from one of the numerous restaurants, featuring local and international foods. Visit New Brunswick Museum and enjoy a Historical Walking tour of Uptown Saint John. Visit the Town of St. Andrews-National Historic District. St. Andrews by-the-Sea is a premier heritage seaside resort and is one of a select few National Historic Districts in Canada. Founded in 1783 by United Empire Loyalists from the U.S. state of Maine, Saint Andrews is home to more than 140 heritage buildings, including five National Historic Sites: St. Andrews Blockhouse (1812), Minister's Island (1786), Greenock Church (1824), Charlotte County Courthouse (1840), Charlotte County Gaol (1832), and just a few kilometres up the St. Croix River you'll find the international historic site of Saint Croix Island, which history dates back to 1604. Saint Andrews is exceptional





among Canadian towns in having an unusually large number of heritage buildings, some dating back as far as 230 years. Old-world charm in the 21st century awaits family, friends and visitors year-round in St. Andrews by-the-Sea.

St. Andrews

Day 3: Experience a whale watching tour with Quoddy Link Marine. Awe-inspiring wildlife experiences in New Brunswick introduce visitors to whales, shorebirds, inland birds and other amazing species of wild animals.

St. Andrews - Fredericton

Day 4: The city of Fredericton, New Brunswick's Riverside Capital. Relax with locals over a craft beer on a lively patio; dive into the rich history on display throughout the city; catch a show at the theatre; explore gargeous parks by land or water. In Fredericton, the urban comes with a delightful side of nature. Built along both sides of the meandering Saint John River, Fredericton has a special connection to the water. 'The Green' is a long park hugging the banks of the river, and locals value it for the breath of fresh air it provides in the heart of the city. Kayaking, rowing, canoeing, and stand-up paddleboarding are common pastimes. Plus, beaches, golf courses, gardens and trails combine to make Fredericton a very active, outdoor city. History lives loud here. Museums, heritage sites, large old Victorian homes, the historic Garrison

District, and the legislative assembly create a connection to bygone days that flavours any explorer's experience. Enjoy it as you discover new restaurants, city markets, and of course, a few of the city's microbreweries - the highest concentration of craft breweries and tasting experiences in the Maritimes. Culture is vibrant here, with galleries, festivals and artists' studios elevating your experience even more. Our province's capital city might just become your main event.

Fredericton - Acadian Coast - Moncton

Day 5: City of Moncton, Canada's only officially bilingual (English & French) city and voted "most polite city in Canada" is located at the geographic centre of the Canadian Maritimes. Location is everything in Moncton, with easy access to two contrasting New Brunswick coastlines - the Fundy Coastal Drive and the Acadian Coastal Drive. Stroll down Main Street, witness the tidal bore roll in from the Bay of Fundy, or discover the cool urban art that's springing up everywhere. There's a lot going on here!

Moncton - Bay Of Fundy Coast - Moncton

Day 6: New Brunswick's most famous geological feature is the Hopewell Rocks, home to the world's highest tides that rise and fall up to an incredible 48 ft. (14 m)! Older than the Appalachian Mountains

and once larger than the Canadian Rocky Mountains, the red cliffs of Hopewell Rocks have been chiseled, over millions of years, by the pounding force of the Fundy tides. It's a place to pause; a place to appreciate a remarkable story interwoven through time, tide, and the intricacies of nature. These are the highest tides in the world after all, and it happens twice a day, every day of the year! At low tide, the sea retreats so far visitors can walk for miles to explore a maze of sky-high rocks that look like sculpted flowerpots. FYI: Each summer, for a 4-6-week period beginning in mid-July, 1 to 2.5 million shorebirds congregate in waves at several key locations in the upper reaches of the bay. The Bay of Fundy is their only stopover on a 2,485 mi (4,000 km) migration south and one of the best locations to see these shorebirds just happens to be at Hopewell Rocks.

Moncton - Departure

Day 7: Do you trust your own perception? Magnetic Hill, where cars simply don't roll uphill. It's impossible, right? Well, drive to the bottom of this world-famous hill, shift into neutral, and be prepared to be amazed. Your car will roll uphill in total defiance of natural law, even as your brain is telling you it's simply not possible. Is it a magnetic pull, an illusion, or a gravitational mystery? Stories about Magnetic Hill have been around since the early 1800s, and this wondrous place has been puzzling visitors for decades.







WONDERS OF ATLANTIC CANADA - NEWFOUNDLAND & LABRADOR


St. John's - Arrival

Day 1: Welcome to Newfoundland and Labrador where wildlife and breathtaking scenery awaits you. Get settled into the Sandman Signature St. John's Hotel and spend the evening getting acquainted with your surroundings.

St. John's

Day 2: Kick off the day and explore all that the port city of St. John's has to offer. Visit the most easterly point in North America at Cape Spear Lighthouse National Historic Site, then visit downtown St. John's. Stop for lunch at one of the many cafes and pubs in

the area. Stroll along two of the oldest streets in North America, Duckworth Street and Water Street, and visit the shops and galleries that line them. At nearby Quidi Vidi Village check out Quidi Vidi Brewery, notable for their Iceberg beer (made with real icebergs), and head to the Quidi Vidi Village Artisan Studios, a collection of small studios highlighting emerging local artists. Downtown St. John's is also known for points of interest such as Jellybean Row, the Rooms, home of Provincial Museum, Archives and Art Gallery and the Terry Fox Memorial. Don't forget to stop at the Johnson Geo Centre and Signal Hill National Historic Site





to take in the colorful views and iconic photo opportunity of St. John's.

St. John's

Day 3: Visit the Irish Loop region just south of St. John's where you can experience Lighthouse Picnics, Ferryland and take a boat tour to the Witless Bay Ecological Reserve to see humpback whales and nesting seabirds. Travel to Ferryland (1 hour south of St. John's) and take short 40-minute hike to Ferryland Lighthouse and enjoy a gourmet picnic from Lighthouse Picnics. Watch for humpback whales from the coastline as you enjoy your picnic. Be sure to also visit the Colony of Avalon, Ferryland established in 1621 by Sir George Calvert (the First Lord Baltimore). Depart Ferryland for Bay Bulls and take a local boat tour to the Witless Bay Ecological Reserve to see whales, Atlantic puffins, and other seabirds. Marvel at marine wildlife up-close on this cruise through the Witless Bay Ecological Reserve. The reserve is home to over 2.5 million seabirds and one of the largest populations of whales in the North Atlantic. Aboard a spacious catamaran with ample viewing areas, admire

icebergs and watch for puffins, whales, razorbills, black legged kittiwakes, and more (wildlife attractions vary with the time of year). Hear live commentary from crew and naturalists on board about Newfoundland's heritage as you travel to Icebera Allev.

St. John's - Clarenville

Day 4: If you enjoy nature viewing you will want to visit Cape St. Mary's Ecological Reserve to view the northern gannets that nest on a 200 ft sea stack, located on the south-west coast of the Avalon Peninsula near St. Bride's. Stand a mere 20 metres from Bird Rock at the Cape St. Mary's Ecological Reserve, one of the most accessible seabird nesting sites in the world. If you like history, Castle Hill National Historic Site is well worth the scenic drive. This site consists of the remains of French and British fortifications and outworks from the late 17th to the early 19th centuries that sits on the top of a peninsula, high above Placentia, Newfoundland offering fantastic views. Depart Placentia for Clarenville.

Clarenville - Gander

Day 5: Depart Clarenville for Gander. North

of Gander Twillingate offers stunningly rugged coastline, historical, picturesque streets, and lush countryside roads. In the waters off the coast, look for whales, dolphins, harp seals, seabirds, and - if the season is right - icebergs. Twillingate is one of the stops along Iceberg Alley, and best places to view all these sights is at Long Point Lighthouse, which looks out over the distant reaches of Notre Dame Bay. Take a boat expedition and witness whales breaching and playing.

Gander - Corner Brook

Day 6: Depart from Gander for Gros Morne National Park. Take in the beautiful scenery as you journey through Newfoundland and Labrador and making your way to a Canadian treasure, Gros Morne National Park, a UNESCO World Heritage Site. Option: Stop in King's Point and tour the sites there.

Corner Brook

Day 7: Spend your day hiking through Gros Morne National Park.

Day 8: Make your way back to St. John's or Depart via air from Deer Lake, NL.







WONDERS OF ATLANTIC CANADA - NOVA SCOTIA

Halifax - Arrival

Day 1: Downtown Halifax has something for everyone, the best place to start, the Halifax Waterfront, is one of the most popular attractions in the province. From here you can hop on a tour to show you around the city! Take a stroll along Spring Garden Road. This is one of the most popular streets in Halifax and a great spot for people watching! While you're there tour the Halifax Public Gardens, a rare example of a formal Victorian garden. For those wanting to learn a bit about the History of Halifax visit one of our museums or historic sites. Visit Pier 21 the Canadian Museum of Immigration to learn about the experiences of immigrants as they arrived in Canada or tour the Maritime Museum of the Atlantic to see the world's finest collection of wooden artifacts from the Titanic. At the top of the city, you will find the Halifax Citadel National Historic Site where the sounds of a modern, bustling port city are exchanged for the crack of rifle-fire and the skirl of bagpipes. Get a taste for Halifax at one of the local restaurants or food vendors. Spend the evening exploring the nightlife of Halifax's Argyle Street. You'll find no shortage of evening entertainment. Grab a drink at one of the unique cocktail bars, take in a bit of live music at one of the many pubs, or get a taste for the Halifax craft beer scene at one of the breweries.

Halifax

Day 2: Depart for the South Shore and be sure to stop at the iconic Peggy's Cove Lighthouse. Wander the working fishing





village of Peggy's Cove where you can visit one of several gift shops, get a taste for the local seafood and snap a photo of one of the worlds most photographed lighthouses. Continue along the South Shore to Mahone Bay, recognized by the three churches that welcome visitors on their way into town. Browse the selection of Art galleries and specialty shops such as Amos Pewter, Birdsall Pottery, Spruce Rugs, The Quilt Shop, etc. are all within an easy stroll. Local must-tastes stops include The Biscuit Eater and JoAnne's Market, The Barn Coffee & Social House, and many more. Visit the seafaring town of Lunenburg, a UNESCO World Heritage Site, with its colourful waterfront, narrow streets and captivating architecture. Old Town Lunenburg is home to Nova Scotia's famous racing schooner, Bluenose II. While in Lunenburg be sure to visit Ironworks Distillery, Fisherman's Museum of the Atlantic, Lunenburg Walking Tours. Lunenburg is filled with fresh seafood that can be found at some of the best restaurants in the province: Salt Shaker Deli, The Old Fish Factory, The Grand Banker Bar & Grill, The Half Shell, etc. If this is all you can fit into a day Lunenburg is home to many Inn's and B&B's.

Halifax - Yarmouth

Day 3: Explore the rugged landscape and take in the breath taking views and sunsets at Cape Forchu Lighthouse. Have a taste of local seafood at the Keeper's Kitchen located next to the lighthouse. Join The Song of the Paddle on one of their paddling excursions and see some of the best scenery that Nova Scotia has to offer. Make your way to Argyler Lodge for the night. While you're there be sure to enjoy a guided kayaking tour of Lobster Bay or a hands-on cooking class in the dining room or on the beach. The Argyler is a unique luxury oceanfront lodge in a fishing village on Lobster Bay.

Yarmouth

Day 4: Make your way to Kejimkujik National Park and National Historic Site. offering visitors the opportunity to hike one of the 14 trails through woodlands and along waterways or to canoe one of the waterways used by the native Mi'kmaq. Discover rock engravings known as petroglyphs, evidence of the presence of the Mi'kmaw people for thousands of years. After a day in the woods or on the water, visitors can set up camp at one of the many campsites throughout the park. Whether you prefer to camp in a tent or trailer, travel to a wilderness site, or try our new equipped accommodations, there is a camping experience for you! When the sun sets, visit the Sky Circle and gaze at brilliant celestial bodies through an onsite telescope, binoculars, or with the naked eye. Drive along the Digby Neck for whale watching on the Bay of Fundy! This is Nova Scotia's premier eco-tourism destination. Long Island and Brier Islands casts out into the rich waters of the world famous Bay of Fundy. During the summer months these waters are home to up to 12 species of whales. This small, quaint town has a variety of accommodations to suit every traveler's style. Digby Pines, a beautiful resort and spa, is nestled within the town and surrounding area. Digby is port for a year-round ferry service that crosses the beautiful Bay of Fundy between Digby and Saint John, New Brunswick.

Yarmouth - Wolfville

Day 5: Visit the charming little village of Hall's Harbour, home to the "Lobster in the Rough" dining experience. Locals and visitors alike flock to this tiny fishing village to select and have prepared a sample





of the world renowned Bay of Fundy lobster. The experience is heightened by devouring this delicacy while seated in the waterfront dining room, the prime stage for observing the highest tides in the world. Begin your Annapolis Valley adventure in Grand Pre, home of Grand Pre National Historic Site, one of three UNESCO World Heritage Sites in Nova Scotia-once the epicentre of Acadian culture and now the most significant memorial to their tragic upheaval. Take in the amazing smells of unique herbs and fruits at The Tangled Garden. The property features the owner's private home along with an extensive herb garden, a labyrinth, art gallery and shop. Explore Nova Scotia's Wine Country. Wolfville is perfectly nestled amongst the majority of Nova Scotia wineries here in the Annapolis Valley. The Wolfville Magic Winery bus is the perfect Hopon, hop-off option to travel between wineries! Wineries on route include Lightfoot and Wolfville, Domain De Grand Pre, Luckett Vineyards, L'Acadie Vineyards and Gaspereau Vineyards. Stop for a bite at one of the Cafes, bistros and pubs on Main St. while browsing boutique shops. Many of the restaurants in Wolfville are dedicated to creating fresh seasonal dishes from local produce and seafood. Spend the night in one of the Victorian

houses in the town which have been converted to historic inns and bed & breakfasts.

Wolfville - New Glasglow

Day 6: Come and walk, play and explore on the ocean floor at Burntcoat Head Park, home of the world's highest recorded tides. 160 billion tones of water flow daily into the basin every 13 hours which is more than the combined flow of the world's freshwater rivers! Experience the one-of-a-kind outdoor adventure, Tidal Bore Rafting! As the 160 billion tonnes of water rushes into the Bay of Fundy at high tide, there is only so much space for it to travel and therefore the great tides actually reverse the flow of rivers that would typically flow into the Bay. Nowhere else in the world can you find this kind of experience! Make your way towards Cape Breton Island, on route spend a night in the area of Pictou or New Glasgow.

New Glasglow - Sydney

Day 7: Follow the Cabot Trail through the Cape Breton Highlands National Park. Check in at the Parks Canada Visitor Centres in Cheticamp. The park offers 26 hiking trails (from easy strolls to strenuous climbs), camping, golf, cycling, wildlife, beaches, look-offs, and guided activities.

Hike one of the parks most popular trails, Skyline Trail. The trail will lead you out to the top of a mountain headland to one of the most spectacular panoramic views in the province that overlooks the Cabot Trail and the ocean. Or enjoy a Lobster boil on the beach. Get out and stretch your legs at the numbers look off points along the trail. Jump on board a Whale Watching tour departing from the Pleasant Bay Wharf. Summer and fall are the best times to go whale watching in Nova Scotia. Pleasant Bay is a convenient spot to grab a bite to eat before reentering the park. If you've filled your day exploring the first leg of the Cabot Trail, Pleasant bay is scattered with welcoming accommodations to spend the night. Or continue along the Cabot Trail Towards Ingonish. Chalets, inns, resorts, cottages and lodges are just a few of the many accommodations in Indonish area.

Sydney

Day 8: Popular stops on route to Ingonish include: Black Brook Beach, Mary Anns Falls, and the Franey Trail only to name a few. Stop by one of the small cafes or bakeries to enjoy a freshly baked pastry and coffee as you take in the fresh salt air. Enjoy the beautiful beaches and go for a dip in the Atlantic Ocean in the clean waters along the shores or





head out kayaking along the shores to take part in some bird watching. Enjoy the spectacular views from the top of the world renowned Highland Links Golf Course as you hit a few rounds. Depart Ingonish for the charming town of Baddeck. Discover the Alexander Graham Bell National Historic Site, home to the world's largest collection of Bell's inventions and artifacts, including replicas of the first telephone and a full-scale model of the HD-4 hydrofoil watercraft. Explore the Bras d'Or lakes by water on a sailing or kayaking tour. There are a wide range of accommodations in Baddeck, from quaint bed and breakfasts to fullsized inns and motels. Spend a night in Baddeck or make your way to Sydney.

Sydney - New Glasglow

This relaxing Pontoon Boat ride along the Liscomb River channel takes you into the open waters of the Atlantic Ocean with Marina Supervisor and Captain, Chester. Visit the resort restaurant for a true Maritime meal with a view of the Liscomb River and the rugged Eastern Shore landscape.

New Glasglow - Halifax - Departure

Day 10: As you make your way back toward Halifax be sure to check out the beautiful beaches along the Eastern shore. Head to Lawrencetown and check-in at East Coast Surf School at Lawrencetown Beach Provincial Park to learn to ride the waves. Summerside

Day 7: Today you will find yourself touring the rich coastal and Acadian culture area of Abram-Village. Indulge in traditional food and authentic musical experiences at the Village Musical Acadien.
